Cyrus Poonawalla "Vaccine King of India"

Cyrus S. Poonawalla, often referred to as the "Vaccine King of India," is a renowned Indian billionaire businessman and the founder of the Serum Institute of India, the world's largest vaccine manufacturer by doses. Born in 1941 into a Parsi family in Pune, Maharashtra, he initially came from a background of horse breeding, as his family owned a stud farm. However, he shifted his focus to biotechnology and healthcare, which led his groundbreaking contributions to global health includes:-

- 1. Serum Institute of India: Founded in 1966, the institute produces over 1.5 billion doses of vaccines annually, including those for measles, polio, and influenza. It played a pivotal role during the COVID-19 pandemic manufacturing vaccines unprecedented scale.
- 2. Philanthropy: Cyrus Poonawalla has been actively involved in philanthropic efforts, particularly in healthcare and education. He has received numerous awards for his contributions, including the Padma Bhushan in 2022.
- 3. Global Recognition: He has been honored with several prestigious awards, such as the Sabin Humanitarian Award and honorary institutions doctorates from like University of Oxford and Johns Hopkins University.

Activities

Basic Life Support TRAINING FOR 4TH YEAR BSc. NURSING

A Basic Life Support (BLS) training session was conducted at NEMCARE Hospital, Guwahati, for the 4th-year B.Sc. Nursing 20 students of NEMCARE Institute of Nursing Sciences, Mirza. The session was led by Dr. Rajib Sharma and aimed at equipping students with essential life-saving skills through hands-on training and evaluations.

The primary objective of teaching BLS is to equip students with essential knowledge and skills to respond effectively in life-threatening situations. This includes understanding the fundamental principles of BLS and mastering hands-on techniques such as CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) and other emergency responses. Training focuses on developing quick decision-making abilities, enabling individuals to act promptly and accurately under high-pressure conditions. Through practical exercises, students learn to address emergencies confidently, ensuring their readiness to provide critical care and save lives. Such education not only fosters preparedness but also instills a sense of responsibility and competence in dealing with medical emergencies.

At the end of the training, students appeared for a viva as well as practiced redemonstration to evaluate the knowledge of clinical interventions for the emergency management of life-threatening conditions. All 20 students successfully demonstrated their skills and knowledge in BLS. After the completion of the session, the students got some ideas as to how this hands-on training is proving effective in a patient care system.

TIPS TO CRACK AN INTERVIEW

Do's:

- 1. Research the Organization: Be well-versed in the company's values, mission, and recent achievements.
- 2. Dress Professionally: Wear attire that matches the organization's culture; when in doubt, lean toward formal.
- 3.Be Punctual: Arrive 10-15 minutes early to show you're dependable and respectful of others' time.
- 4. Maintain Good Body Language: Sit straight, make appropriate eye contact, and give a firm handshake if offered.
- 5. Prepare Answers and Questions: Practice common interview questions and prepare thoughtful questions about the role.
- 6.Be Honest: Speak truthfully about your skills and experiences without exaggeration.
- 7. Show Confidence: Answer with clarity and maintain a positive attitude.
- 8. Listen Actively: Let the interviewer finish their questions before responding.

Don'ts:

- 1. Don't Be Late: Being tardy can create a negative first impression.
- 2. Avoid Over-Talking: Stick to the point—rambling may indicate a lack of focus.
- 3. Don't Criticize Past Employers: This can come across as unprofessional or negative.
- 4. Avoid Using Slang or Informal Language: Maintain a professional tone throughout.
- 5. Don't Lie or Stretch the Truth: Misinformation can easily backfire if discovered.
- 6.Don't Be Distracted: Keep your phone silent and maintain focus on the interviewer.
- 7. Avoid Monotone Answers: Show enthusiasm and interest in the conversation.
