Jadav Payeng, known as the "Forest Man of India," is an environmental activist from Majuli, Assam. Over the past several decades, he has single-handedly transformed a barren sandbar on the Brahmaputra River into a lush forest, now known as Molai Forest. His journey began in 1979 when he was just 16 years old, motivated by the sight of dead snakes that had washed ashore after a flood. Payeng started planting bamboo and other trees, and his relentless efforts have resulted in a thriving ecosystem that spans over 1,300 acres. This forest is now home to various wildlife, including Bengal tigers, Indian rhinoceroses, and elephants. In recognition of his incredible work, Payeng was awarded the Padma Shri, one of India's highest civilian honors, in 2015.




73RD IPC HYDERABAD





Upgrading healthcare facilities, particularly in rural and tribal areas, is essential to ensure that primary healthcare centers are well-equipped with the necessary medical equipment and have access to reliable utilities. Efforts must also be made to recruit and retain healthcare professionals in underserved areas through incentives and capacity-building programs.
